Musical Monday, Aug. 22 – Strike Up the Band (1940)

Jimmy Connors (Mickey Rooney) and Mary Holden (Judy Garland) put on a show to raise cash so the musical kids in town can enter a prestigious orchestra competition. But the real world tangles with their dream, and soon it's unclear whether they'll make it to the contest. Hollywood's musical master Busby Berkeley directs this musical comedy, which won an Oscar for Best Sound and nominations for Best Score and Song.

Tuesday, Aug. 23– Glory (1989)

Loosely based on the letters of Boston-born Union commander Col. Robert G. Shaw (Matthew Broderick), this Academy Award-winning war film follows the first group of African-Americans to serve in combat during the Civil War. The heroics of Shaw's volunteer regiment of black soldiers, including a fugitive slave (Denzel Washington, in an Oscar-winning performance) and a grave digger (Morgan Freeman), help turn the tide of the war.
Rated R for violence; 2hr. 02 min.

Western Wednesday, Aug. 24 – The Frisco Kid (1979)

Armed with his yarmulke and a cross-country mission to reach San Francisco's Barbary Coast neighborhood, naive Polish rabbi Avram Belinski is a natural target for swindlers and thieves in the bustling port city of Philadelphia. But with a rough-and-tumble bank robber by his side, he takes on the American West and makes an unlikely friend in the process.

World War II Thursday, August 18th – MacArthur (1977)

Field Marshal Erwin Rommel (convincingly portrayed by James Mason) was known for his exploits in the Afrika Korps. This classic film, directed by Henry Hathaway, chronicles Rommel's life -- including his military career, his contribution to supposed attempts on Adolf Hitler's life and his lonely demise. Jessica Tandy co-stars as Rommel's wife.

New Release Friday, Aug.26 – The Flight of the Phoenix (2004)

When a C-119 cargo plane full of oil workers crashes in Mongolia's Gobi Desert during a sandstorm, the survivors attempt to build a new plane from the parts they find in the wreckage, led by downed pilot Frank Towns. The rag-tag group must work together in a desperate effort to stay alive and return to civilization. This is a remake of the 1965 film that starred James Stewart.

Director Aaron Schneider's deft blend of dark humor and poignancy also stars Bill Murray as Frank Quinn, the huckster owner of a failing funeral home, and Lucas Black as his dubious assistant.

Box Tops Make Cents

Meadowlark teams with Lee school to collect box tops

Meadowlark Hills announces a partnership with Lee Elementary School to participate in The General Mills Box Tops for Education program. This program has benefited schools across the United States since 1996. For each "box top" that is clipped and turned in, the school receives 10 cents.

Lee Elementary has been participating in the Box Top program for several years. During the 2010-2011 school year, Lee Elementary earned almost \$1,200. A portion of this money was used for the care of the school's social therapy dog, Cypress. Cypress is a Labrador which attends school each day, spending much of his time with behavioral challenged students. He also is with other students for them to love on and read to him. The rest of the money will be used in conjunction with the renovation to be completed this fall. Lee plans to use the money to purchase new equipment, such as computer projection equipment, digital cameras, printers and a new copying machine.

Traci Taylor, a Lee School PTO member, spoke at Town Meeting on Aug. 8, 2011, saying that that in-



volvement in the program can take many different forms. Meadowlark Hills residents who wish to contribute can clip the box tops of the products they purchase and drop them in the collection boxes on campus. There also are online opportunities. By registering on the Box Tops for Education website, residents can get updates on the school's progress. Dillons Plus Shopper's cards can also be registered online. and the school will receive electronic "box tops".

Jean Beatty, Resident Council Chair, said the residents of Meadowlark Hills are always eager to participate in projects which benefit local schools. "The Resident Council feels that the Box Top program at Lee Elementary School is a worthwhile and is an easy way for residents to raise funds that will directly benefit the students," Beatty said.

The Lee School PTO will provide collection boxes to Meadowlark Hills. These boxes will be emptied once a month and the total collected by Meadowlark Hills will be reported to Resident Council, Lee Elementary School students, teachers and administrators. The PTO group also will come to Meadowlark Hills to assist anyone wanting to

register their Dillons card online for electronic box top collections for Lee School. Watch a future Messenger of TouchTown for news of this opportunity.
