

Hog Wild in October!

Inaugural HOGtoberfest to Raise Money & Awareness for Good Samaritan Fund

Friends of Meadowlark Hills have a fun and tasty opportunity to support the Meadowlark Hills Foundation's Good Samaritan Fund when the doors to Cox Bros. BBQ open at 11 a.m. on Oct. 16. Bud and Bobby Cox, the aforementioned Cox brothers, pledge to donate 10% of that day's proceeds to the Fund. HOGtoberfest, one of three Cox Cares fund-raisers benefitting local programs and organizations, has a format similar to Pig Out for Parkinson's, which is held in April and supports the Parkinson's Program of Manhattan at Meadowlark Hills.

"Pig Out has been going for a few years now, and it's just gotten better. With Mama and Daddy living at Meadowlark Hills, I wondered if there was another Meadowlark Hills program we could help with an event like Pig Out," said Bud Cox, son of Newton and Ellie Cox. "We're using the name Cox Cares for these outreach efforts, and I'd like to find one more group to support, so we'd have one event roughly every quarter." (In addition to the Parkinson's Program and the Good Samaritan Fund, the Flint Hills Bread

Basket benefits from a Cox Cares event in July.)

When Bud approached Sarah Duggan and me about organizing an event similar to the one supporting the Parkinson's Program, Sarah and I agreed that one benefiting the Good Samaritan Fund is a logical choice. However, we did not want this event to be confused with Pig Out for Parkinson's or to be scheduled soon after the April eat-at-Cox Bros. event. The HOGtoberfest committee, composed of Tracy Musselman, Pam Reding and me, has teamed with Bud to borrow a few popular ideas from Pig Out, such as pulled pork sliders for \$2 each, but have strived to create a new brand of hog heaven.

Along with offering those pulled pork sliders from the restaurant's opening to closing, a hog roast buffet is planned beginning at 6 p.m. In addition, anyone who makes a Cox Bros. BBQ purchase that day has the opportunity to win a door prize: a tailgate package for 10! The package includes pulled pork and pulled chicken, potato salad and smokehouse beans, as well as buns, sauce, pickles and disposable dinnerware.

Al Bowyer Musical Performance



Q: Why is the aerator in the pond turned off?

The aerator is turned off at this time for a couple reasons. The aerator is keeping the pond stirred up and muddy. The aerator may be helpful and turned back on if there is concern about the oxygen level in the pond, especially during some hot days when the oxygen level may drop. However, the pond is below the recommended depth currently for running the aerator, and the aerator may increase evaporation. At this time the recommendation from the marine biologist that has been consulted is that the aerator may do

more harm than good as it was stirring the up bottom and keeping the solids suspended due to the water level in the pond. He suggests that we not turn it on until the pond is near



full. He also let us know that the algae growth in the pond is not harmful to the fish, it is just not very appealing. Thank you for another great question, and please keep them coming.
