New Business: Jean Beatty

- 1. Employment Appreciation- Jean Beatty asked the Council members to speak with the residents about the timing and the name of the annual staff appreciation gift. Ideas and suggestions for change will be discussed at the April meeting.
- **2. Board of Trustee Member Don Rasmussen-** Don Rasmussen's current board term is ending and he is eligible to serve another 3 year term. The council members voted and approved by unanimous vote for Don to serve three more years on the Board of Trustees.

1. Action Items

- **a.** New Resident Checklist- At the February meeting, Jean requested that the reps bring a copy of their new resident checklist to the March meeting. This item will be carried over to the April meeting as only two reps responded to the request.
- b. Political Signs/Meeting Policy- Amanda Rall and the committee presented the formatted Political Signs/Meeting Policy. - **d.** Crossing Stripes- Don Rasmussen reported that Mike Davis is still looking into different paints for the crosswalks.
- **e.** Washers & Dryers- Dirk Daveline reported that the washers and dryers will be selected soon. Each floor will have a choice in the style that they would like, front load or top load.
- **f. Signage at Entrances-** Lonnie Baker reported that the signage around the campus is obvious except for the main entrance. He suggested that a sign be placed there.
- **g. Security-** Amanda Rall reported that bids are being submitted for a security camera system. Also being discussed is the possibility of providing more security or extending the hours of the person at the Hospitality Desk.

- 1. Key Pads Locks on Doors- Concerns were heard about residents who have installed key pad locks and padlocks on the inside of their doors. Emergency access to these residences would be difficult.
- **2. Pond Access-** Don Rasmussen reported that a committee is being formed to address adding paths and fishing areas that are wheelchair safe around the pond by Bramlage and Wroten houses.
