Sometimes interesting things happen when you're a little kid hanging around, looking for action. The back yards of the corner lots opened out to each other, with a little wooden shed the only structure. Years before, it had been torn down and a bed of petunias planted where it had been.

Now the new property owner, who had been fencing in his yard, had arrived at the petunia bed and was fixing to set a fence post. His spade had hit something that clinked, so he lifted his spade and moved it a few inches and tried again. Another clink.

Puzzled, the new property owner paused and leaned on his spade, thinking. A long-time neighbor, we called The Old Timer, had been standing off to the side, watching, with a look of amusement on his face. He ambled over to the new property owner and said softly, "I'd be real careful with that spade if I was you."

Looking up, the new property owner said, "Uh, why?" A look of reverence came over The Old Timer's face as he said, "Mister, the finest white lightening ever made is under

them petunias."

Our previous neighbor had been a bootlegger during the Roaring Twenties. His house had lots of visitors after dark. Apparently someone squawked and the police made dutiful raids several times. My sister said the kitchen was a sticky mess. And her landlord wasn't thrilled about the hole in the kitchen floor.

Meadowlark Hills is 34 years old this month (February). The first resident in Health Care moved in Feb. 1, 1980. Three days later, three more residents moved in. The Director of Health Care was Nancy Barnaby, RN, and her assistant was Ann Sand. Linda (McAnarney) Frey, RN, Sherry (Berry) Smith and Vivian Dane soon joined them on the staff. Sherry and Vivian are still with us on the staff!

The first independent living residents were Al and Mae Messenheimer (Al was a Board member) and Mrs. Ruth Lovell, who moved in on Feb. 4, 1980. John Grace, CEO, gave them a royal welcome. By November

1980, 95 percent of the apartments were occupied by 97 residents.

The Dedication and Ribbon Cutting for Meadowlark Hills happened on June 8, 1980, with an open house and tours of the building.
