Please mark your calendars for 5 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 1, at Cico Park's Pottorf Hall. Proceeds benefit the Meadowlark Hills Foundation's Good Samaritan Fund. which assists residents in Meadowlark Hills healthcare households who have outlived their financial resources. Vern Gannon of Gannon Auctions is donating his time and that of his staff members so that more auction revenue will go toward the fund.

Part of my duties as Development Director has been to meet with residents and family members during their downsizing processes, and I've had the pleasure to work over the past year with many cheerful givers. A variety of sofas, chairs, tables, desks, dressers and lamps have been stacked as high as is safe in three storage units around Manhattan, and on the morning of Sept. 1, Pat Callaghan and a team of movers will load the contents of our three units and haul the small items on tables and dust off furniture, etc., but no goods to Pottorf. Pat also is generously donating his time and the use of his truck and trailers.

Because the Market has been an annual event in August or September for several years, it has come to my attention

that several residents have been saving items in anticipation of a sale. Those items may be donated again this year, and (If Kinzie Jo Zimmerman sells this apartment, we'll need to move our donation drop-off location – a great obstacle to overcome!))

Donations will be accepted from 2 to 5 p.m. on Friday, Aug. 21, and from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Friday, Aug. 28. A limited number of smaller items, such as glassware and knick-knacks, will be sold at the auction. Anything not reserved for the auction will be taken to Trinity Presbyterian Church, one of our six founding churches, for their annual rummage sale on Aug. 29. We will not accept clothing, shoes, books and outdated electronic equipment, such as old TVs. Flat-screen models are welcome.


Jean Kennedy Performance



Kinesiology Research Participants Needed

The K-State Department of Kinesiology is looking for residents to participate in an upcoming research project. The study will look at how aging influences cardiovascular variables such as blood pressure and blood flow during a breathing test. The researchers will compare the responses to those of college-aged individuals to further their understanding of how breathing during physical activity affects exercise tolerance across age.

Participants would need to visit the research lab, in Ahearn Fieldhouse, three times over a two or three week period. They estimate that each lab visit would last around one hour. ten-30 participants, both male and female are needed, subjects must be healthy (no chronic/acute illness), and need to be at least 60 years of age. Outdoor Encounters

Garrison Keillor, of the Prairie Home Companion fame, once remarked, "It is more worthy in the eyes of God... If a writer makes three pages sharp and funny about the lives of geese than to make three hundred fat and flabby about God or the American people."

Tweaking this quote just a bit, the same can be said about our on-campus natural area and trails. Watching quietly, leanly and sharply pays honor to the "First Book of God." One recent evening (22 of July), I stood quietly and watched our two or three huge grass carp feeding along the banks, barley under the surface. They take in some algae, but especially love the tender roots and shoots of aquatic plants along the shores.

The carp certainly is one of our least appealing fishes, but what they were doing, and how they survive and do what they do in an aquatic freshwater environment are caused for wonder and awe. Sometimes it seems as if they are playing. It is well established that the adults of some species do play, e.g. otters enjoying their slides down snowy slopes or ravens flying short distances upside down.

Dessert for my evening feast came when I moved up and stood quietly on the dam: two members of a small heron species flew out of the trees lining the east side of the K-State Pond. Since most species within the heron family nest trees, I wonder. Have to check that out. Dusk impaired diagnostic acuity, but my best guess is black-crowned night heron. I never have seen this species do anything I would interpret as play.

Meeting Date: July 6, 2015

Sandra Emley welcomed all meeting attendees.

Updates

General Update: Lonnie shared the Honstead and Sloan renovations were underway. Several rooms were done and received a much needed "facelift". Changes included new flooring, ceiling tracks, lighting, bathroom fixtures among other significant upgrades. Lonnie will be gone on vacation for a week leaving Wednesday, July 8, heading to Colorado. Upon his return from his vacation, he will be out for another week attending the Board of LeadingAge Kansas retreat. Sarah Duggan announced that Hospitality Team member, Mary Irsik gave her resignation notice.

Building and Grounds Update: Loren Alexander stated the rumble strips should be getting installed soon, but did not have a specific date. Monte Spiller reported he attended the Building and Grounds meeting and informed the committee of plans concerning the Westside parking. The plan is to remove the individual signs, paint numbers on the inside of the brick and just have two signs at the either end stating all the spaces were reserved for residents only.

Board Update: Jean Beatty reported there were no updates at this time.

Approval of June Minutes:

Motion to approve minutes was moved, seconded and passed unanimously.

New Business:

A request made for someone from Buildings and Grounds Committee to look at the amount of trees, branches, brush, around the first duplexes on the right side by Kimball. It was potentially dangerous and an eye sore. Also a concern about the ivy plant killing trees in that area.

Old Business:

Sarah Duggan reported that Mark Morton has cleaned the breezeway.

A suggestion was made regarding certain crosswalks be eliminated. Specifically the crosswalk which leads from the parking area on the east over to the apartments across the street.

Sarah Duggan stated the purchases of Community Room chairs are budgeted for the new fiscal year and she believes the plan is to buy all new chairs. However that could change.

Sarah Duggan followed up about the recycling bins. The lock was broken and that has been fixed and there should not be future problems.

Additional Discussion Topics:

- The Question was asked about the possibility of saving electricity by turning the lights off. Lonnie explained that all the lights are off at night, keeping lights during the day is not very inviting.
- Questions were raised about monitoring the watering of the lawns. Mike Davis and his team have done extensive research on options for a reasonable system and at the end of day we want Meadowlark Hills to be green. There has been a lot of improvement with water usage over the last four years.
- Concern was raised about the cost of the fireworks. Lonnie explained the 4th of July firework display is like any other event here at Meadowlark Hills. It comes out of the operating budget and cost around a couple of thousand dollars, which is consistent with other events like Summerfest.
- Concern expressed about the care of the patio cushions at Prairie Star, when we have high winds and rain. Jayme Minton and Prairie Star are working on getting two new storage bins for the patio cushions and feel confident they will be stored appropriately each evening or with the threat of inclement weather.
- Additional questions regarding the college students. Sarah Duggan explained every year is different. With different years, come different students and personalities. Students are provided a place to eat and stay. Every class of students goes through the same orientation as other classes.
- Concerns expressed about the shrubbery off to the right when you turn onto Kimball. Could the maintenance team look at the tree limbs on a monthly basis. Lonnie stated when they do the road expansion they are going to take the turn out.
