Formal attire is suggested, but not required.


Winter Ball is always a great way to start off the new year! Come enjoy heavy appetizers, a cash bar, ballroom dancing and time with your friends.

Outdoor Encounters

Today (Sat, 16 Jan), from 2-3:30 p.m., I hiked the Bayer Pond and woods and the woods east of the KSU pond. Because of the balmy weather (41 degrees, sunny, and clam) I expected the edges of the pond ice sheets to be melted. But saw only two sorts of activity: one incident of waves indicating a fish was working near the shore in the SW neck of Bayer pond and, in a couple of places, submerged pond-edge leaves under the ice were waving gently. This surely was caused by movements of fish, nearby, but unseen. I was looking at Bayer Pond as a brick, and this is the sort of thing that looking at the pores of the brick can give you. But not tomorrow.

I was preoccupied with both tomorrow (predicted high of 12 degrees) and the opening lines of Christina Rossetti's famous poem/song:

In the bleak midwinter, frosty winds made moan, Earth stood hard as iron, water like a stone;

Rossetti (1830-94) refers later in this poem to heavy snows "long ago," which means she probably was thinking of Europe's mini-ice age of a few centuries prior. Recall the winter scenes painted by the two Brueghels depicting that time.

Chickadees and juncos, seemingly cheerfully, were using the feeder in the woods west of Bayer Dam, and, randomly, I watched robins, cardinals, and one blue jay. Saw no sign of the covey of quail often observed around the feeders found in the woods or on the dam. However, my score was not so bad since, at the same time, a young father was taking his two talkative young sons on a long walk through our Natural Area. Their questions were refreshing. That father and his sons will not be statistics of the sort used by Rich Louv in his disturbing book entitled *Last Child in the Woods*.

But tomorrow I will be reading comfortably in my recliner, and just maybe at least that blue jay will wish it had paid a bit more attention to the field manual on ornithological winter protocol to be followed by members of its species.

On the Mystery of the Disappeared Meat Stew

Meat, during World War II, was consumed mostly by our troops, with smaller proportion for civilians. Thus it was that the most popular dish in the cafeterias for the Pentagon's 40,000 workers was tasty, filling meat stew, with two crackers, for 15 cents.

Getting to the cafeteria before they ran out of meat stew was an incentive for an early lunch. A yummy bowl of meat stew, two crackers, and you were set.

But things changed. Suddenly, even early arrivers found no meat stew. It had been that way for days. When early diners protested: "Hey! Where's our meat stew?", The cafeteria workers didn't say a word. In fact, they didn't even look at us when we asked. What could be going on?

Morale was an important part of our war effort. Some of the mothers of Government Girls, as we were called, who had left sheltered lived to respond to our appointment to work in Washington, D.C., were apprehensive of the government's mindfulness of their daughters. They need not have worried. Uncle Sam was well aware of the precious sons and daughters engaged in the war effort.

Washington, D.C. newspapers reported new legislation "for the duration of the war." I noticed one new ruling that: "Whenever animal meat is served for human consumption, the animal from which it came will be clearly identified by name."

Uh oh. Remember morale? What would have happened if a few letters home had said "Guess what? That terrific meat stew I've been telling you we get at the Pentagon turns out to have a new name. Now it's called 'horse meat stew.'"

Of course the war effort couldn't risk that. So our beloved meat stew disappeared forever and the cafeteria workers didn't say a word. I never mentioned my theory about its disappearance to anyone.

It is said: "A rose by any other name would be as sweet." I'm not sure our beloved meat stew would have survived under its real name, though it was tasty and filling, for 15 cents.
