Beach Museum Trip

"First Folio! The Book That Gave Us Shakespeare" exhibit



Meadowlark Hills will be taking a group to the Beach Museum of Art located on Kansas State University campus Tuesday, Feb. 9, visiting the exhibit, "First Folio! The Book That Gave Us Shakespeare."

This is a collection of famous plays, including *Macbeth, Julius Caesar, Twelfth Night* and fifteen others by Shakespeare that would probably have been lost to us without the First Folio. Published in 1623, the

First Folio is the first collected edition of Shakespeare's plays, and only 233 copies are known today. To mark the 400th anniversary of Shakespeare's death, the Folger Shakespeare Library is sending a First Folio to every state in the United States; the Beach Museum was selected as the venue for the Folio's display in Kansas.

Join us as K-State honors the greatest playwright of the English language with this exhibit from the world's largest Shakespeare collection.

The cost for transportation is \$3 and will depart from the Village Entrance at 10:15 a.m. A sign-up sheet is available for this event in the Blue Book located at the Hospitality Desk.

Riley County Historical Society

A presentation on Forming a Free-State Manhattan

Allana Saenger, from Riley County Historical Society, will be presenting "Forming a Free-State Manhattan," at 7 p.m. Friday, Feb. 26, in the Community Room.

Kansas Territory opened for settlement in 1854 under the Kansas-Nebraska Act that mandated "popular sovereignty" in the territory. This allowed settlers to decide whether slavery would be allowed within the borders of Kansas. Seeking to establish Kansas as a Free-State, anti-slavery settlers such as Isaac and Ellen Goodnow and Reverend Charles and Julia Lovejoy traveled with the New England Emigrant Aid Company to settle in Manhattan in the spring of 1855.

In this presentation, she will look at Bleeding Kansas history through the dairies of these early Manhattan pioneers and their determination to form a free-state.

Center on Aging Lecture Series



Updates

- 1. General Update: Lonnie shared the Honstead and Sloan renovations should be completed toward the end of May 2016. Renovations for the third floor will start around February 5 and last through approximately March 25. The fourth floor renovation will start around March 7 and last through April 15. The fifth floor renovation will start around March 28 and last through May 6. During the month of March, all three floors will experience some type of construction or activity. Meetings will be held to allow residents that are affected by the construction and renovation to meet with the Project Manager, Jon Bechtel, to give their input and feedback on their particular floor. The meetings with take place prior to February 4. The chairs by the elevator on the second floor of independent living were removed due to the size of the chairs. - 3. Board of Trustees: There were no reports from the committees and the next meeting will be February 2016.
