Brothers Bud and Bobby Cox, sons of Meadowlark Hills resident Ellie Cox, pledge to donate 10% of that day's proceeds to the Fund.

Food specials on Oct. 13 at Cox Bros. BBQ, 223 McCall Road, include pulled pork sliders for \$2 each, available from the restaurant's opening to closing at 9 p.m., and a hog roast buffet beginning at 6 p.m. In addition, anyone who makes a Cox Bros. BBQ purchase on Oct. 13 may register to win a door prize: a barbecue meal for 10! Residents and employees who purchased a HOGtoberfest T-shirt also will be entered to win the door prize. The package includes two meats, two sides as well as buns, sauce, pickles and disposable dinnerware.

Back by popular demand will be two nods to traditional Oktoberfest favorites. Live music will be provided by accordion player Rusty Schwerdt, and a beer tasting and buying station will be operated by Flint Hills Beverage beginning at 6 p.m.

HOGtoberfest would certainly be fun with just barbecue, brews and music, but keep reading, there's more! In order to create additional opportunities to raise money and awareness for the Good Samaritan Fund, a Hog & Kisses Contest has begun, and 50/50 raffle tickets are now on sale. The 50/50 raffle winner takes home half of the money collected by ticket sales, and half of the proceeds support the Good Samaritan Fund. The more tickets we sell, the bigger your prize! Prize tickets are \$1 each, six for \$5, 15 for \$10 and 40 for \$20 and may be purchased at the Hospitality Desk.

The classes are led by LSVT and Speak Out! Certified Voice Clinician and KSU Graduate Students in Speech-Language Pathology.


The next voice class is scheduled from 2:15 to 3:15 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 19, in the KSU Classroom.

Tornado Presentation by Mary Knapp *Friday, Sept. 16, at 7 p.m.*

After a tornado leaves town, Mary Knapp knows her phone will ring. Knapp, an associate agronomist with Kansas State University Research and Extension, is also the states climatologist. Knapp will be at Meadowlark Hills to present over the tornadoes that have touched down in Manhattan, Kansas at 7 p.m. Friday, Sept. 16, in the Community Room.

The presentation will discuss the 50th anniversary of the 1966 tornado that touched down north of the Amherst neighborhood, Jardine complex, a married student housing at the time, and St. Mary's Hospital, which is now Via Christ Health. The storm that caused nearly 40 injuries, but no deaths, has marked Manhattan's history for a lifetime.

Additionally, Knapp will present over the 2008 "Miller Ranch" Tornado, that left behind damage in the Miller Ranch neighborhood, the Little Apple Toyota building, crossed its way through Anderson Avenue and headed north east towards Denison Road and College Heights Road. Welcome & Introduction of New Residents, Monte Spiller

Monte welcomed the Town Meeting attendees. There were no new residents in attendance.

Campus Update, Lonnie Baker

Lonnie explained that Meadowlark Hills as a whole is still looking at long range planning. The search has been an elaborate process for many reasons — one of them being that our world keeps changing. Meadowlark Hills services are intended to expand outside our campus and grow within the Manhattan community.

Home Health is growing rapidly throughout the region and Meadowlark Hills want to make sure that it is positioned for individuals that are needing that care. In order to create a strategic plan to serve the needs of those in need of Home Health and additional services, there are a few changes within our administration.

First on the list is Sarah Duggan, Community Relations Director. Sarah has been involved in many areas within this organization and has took on the responsibility of directing and managing our Home Health department. This is a full-time job in itself, and in addition she is involved with the Physicians Office, Independent Living Operations, Sales, Marketing, Fitness Services, Community Relations and many more areas. In order to free Sarah space to focus more on expanding Home Health — we have transitioned some of Sarah's responsibilities over to Jayme Minton, Support Services Director. Jayme is now overseeing Independent Living Operations and Sales. Now that Jayme manages two additional areas, awe have coupled Human Resources department with Finance. Chris Nelson, Finance Director, will take on leadership for our Human Resources department.

Due to the new changes, offices will be shifting. A new organizational chart will be distributed at the Office Party scheduled to be next month.

Jayme introduced IT Leader, Will Gold. IT is one of the departments that falls underneath Support Services. Raspberry Pi, a low cost microprocessor that has open sores, which means everyone in the world is free to develop the architecture itself. Larry was assigned to learn and research how the team can use a Raspberry Pi processor to emulate more expensive processors like Intel and AMD. Larry spent three months physically creating an arcade machine. The project was very successful and Larry managed to make the processor run not just one vendor software, but five or six different vendor software's.

Larry explained that he wanted to build something that he was passionate about and introduce the audience to his passion. Larry's ideas came from enjoying video games as a child growing up in the 90s. The arcade machine includes many different 90s arcade games and was created to benefit residents.

Eighty-six. 486. \$414. \$8,671. Put these numbers together, and they add up to another successful Meadowlark Hills benefit auction. On Saturday, Sept. 10, auctioneer Vern Gannon and his staff sold 486 items/groups of items for \$8,671 in merchandise. Add the \$414 of revenue generated at the Auction Café, and the event total is slightly more than \$9000! The event was held in the Utopia Room at St. Thomas More Catholic Church, a larger space than our 2015 location (Pottorf Hall).

Items prompting intense bidding from 86 registered participants included an oak bedroom set donated by the family of the late Margaret Walker; a Friends of Beach Museum of Art print by Oscar Larmar; an adjustable bed and a teak buffet donated by resident Jane Westfall; several washer/dryer sets, and a cast iron Fido bank donated by the late Lincoln Deihl, which was pictured in a previous Messenger.

The number of bidders was 22 fewer than in 2015, but the number of auction items and revenue generated from those items and food sales topped last year's totals.

My request for jewelry was answered in a big way! We ended up with two eight-foot tables loaded with necklaces, bracelets, rings, brooches and earrings. Most was costume jewelry, but several gold and silver pieces, as well as some real pearls, gemstones and diamonds attracted collectors who carefully examined the items with magnifying glasses prior to the auction's start. The highest-selling piece was a gold and diamond brooch that brought \$375. The jewelry contributed about \$1900 to the day's total.

Additional good news is that expenses for this year's sale were significantly lower than last year's, so more of the proceeds will go toward our Good Samaritan Fund. The fund helps to support residents in our healthcare households who have outlived their financial resources.

Many are to thank for helping to ensure a positive outcome. Once again, Pat Callaghan and Gannon Auctions donated their services. Callaghan began loading trailers with furniture on Thursday, Sept. 8, in order to bring it into the church on Friday. Vern Gannon, and his wife, Sherri, also were on hand several hours on Friday to oversee the arrangement of the items at the church before returning early on Saturday.

Five residents who attend St. Thomas More made a donation to Meadowlark Hills Foundation so that we would be able to give the church a monetary gift for the use of the Utopia Room. The church's maintenance staff set up the space with tables and chairs and swept up afterward, so this gift is well-deserved.

Diamond Real Estate Management allows us to use two units at Amherst Self-Storage free of charge so that we may

Goodbye summer, hello flu season!

The leaves are changing, the air is turning crisp and the next stop is flu season and even better, flu shots! Two Flu Shot Clinics have been scheduled for Independent Living



residents. Flu shots given at these on-campus clinics will be billed to your insurance. There will be at least two nurses at each Flu Shot Clinic to assist in administering the vaccine. Join us for a clinic at whichever date and time listed below works best for you.

- Wednesday, October 12, from 2 to 4 p.m. in the KSU Classroom
- Friday, October 14, from 8 to 10 a.m. in the KSU Classroom

In addition to receiving your flu shot, it's important to remember what to look for and how to take extra care of ourselves to avoid getting sick.

The flu spreads from person to person, up to about six feet away. Many experts believe the flu is spread mainly by droplets made from people with the flu when they sneeze, cough or talk. To avoid this, stay home if you are sick and stay away from others who are ill. It is important to wash your hands often with soap and water and disinfect surfaces and objects that may be contaminated with germs like the flu.

The flu often comes on suddenly and people who have the flu experience all or some of the following symptoms:

- fever, or feeling feverish/chills
- cough
- sore throat
- runny or stuffy nose
- muscle or body aches
- headaches
- fatigue

If you are sick with flu-like illness, stay home for at least 24 hours after your fever is gone except for medical care or for other necessities. Your fever should be gone without the use of a fever-reducing medicine. When sick, limit your contact with others as much as possible. Thanks for stopping by – see you next week!
