Dr. Littrell is retiring from Kansas State University and this concert will salute his distinguished career at the university.

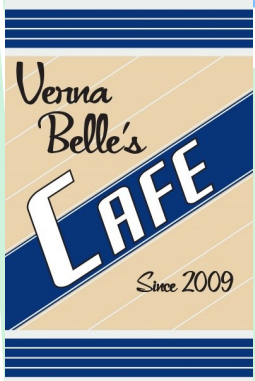
Cowboys & Quartet
