Holiday Shopping Trip


Wednesday, Dec. 5, at 9 a.m.

Changes, updates, renovations—OH MY!

We loved the yard, the layout and the fact the neighborhood was full of young families with more moving in each month. Most of all we were, and continue to be, very excited about the options to make it our own.

The basement is unfinished (still), but since we've moved in our projects have included a backyard fence, sealing the driveway, painting three rooms, replacing the carpet with wood flooring throughout the house and tiling the hallway bathroom floor. Edward is nothing short of busy keeping up with all the changes that are turning our house into our home.

Meadowlark is moving toward some changes of its own throughout the coming months. On top of the list is the addition of a fleet parking lot, which will be located directly behind the maintenance shop and the garden apartments on the southwest side of campus. This addition will add 25 new spots where we will park our transportation and maintenance vehicles. As a result, 25 spots in the west parking lot will be made available for visitors and employees. Pending final approval from the city, the project is anticipated to begin in the next couple of weeks. Our hope is to complete the parking lot before the holidays.

Slightly more exciting (okay, A LOT more exciting) is the Courtyard Renovation! This project is expected to be underway soon. The entire courtyard will be laid with pavers and will feature a bocce court, outdoor seating, bar and grill, fire pit and a putting green. Once the project begins, the courtyard will be closed until the completion of the construction. Currently the project in pending final design renderings based on feedback from the city of Manhattan. In the meantime, a Courtyard Celebration is planned for Monday, Nov. 5, around 10 a.m. immediately following Town Meeting. We'll gather in the Game Room, Grosh Cinema and the Manhattan Room. Pete Reid from Blueville Nursery created the courtyard plan with feedback from residents and staff and will attend to answer your questions and show an updated version of the video that was played August's Town Meeting. He's also putting together a display of some of the building materials: pavers, landscape block and the new bar/grill countertop. There will be food and drink served during the celebration, including grilled French toast bites with toppings and mimosas (alcoholic and nonalcoholic).

Lastly, an architect has been chosen for the upcoming Kitchen Renovation. Kevin Cowan Architects out of Overland Park met with our Meadowlark team early last week to discuss preliminary expectations for the renovation. A focus group will be scheduled to gain feedback from residents and staff on the project, particularly on the changes that will affect Prairie Star Restaurant and the possible addition of an event and/or atrium space. This project will take several months to complete, and it is our goal to schedule as little kitchen downtime as possible. Regardless, we can expect at least a few weeks of time where the kitchen won't be in use. Updates will be shared regularly in the Meadowlark Messenger throughout the duration of all pending projects.

I am excited about the opportunities our updated spaces will bring once they are completed. As I say, life is always changing.
