Resident Kay Shanks was recognized as a caregiver who supports individuals with Alzheimer's disease and related disorders. Duane Smith passed away in October and his daughter, Becky, presented the award on his behalf.

Kay was a loving caregiver and advocate for her late husband. Rev. Roger Shanks for 11 years. Kay's exemplary care for Roger and selflessness established her as a pillar of resources, not only in on the Meadowlark Memory Meadowlark, but for the greater

Manhattan community. Even under times of distress, Kay always focused on Roger's dignity and lived the example of person-centered care. Her interactions with Roger, family and the community consistently helped people realize it is possible to still have a high quality of life in the face of Alzheimer's.

Kay was instrumental in helping the leadership of Meadowlark understand the value and need for a Memory Program to implement programming and educational opportunities for all those living with dementia and Alzheimer's in the Flint Hills region. Kay continues to serve Leadership Team.



Whistler". No one knows why.


Word of the super-goo reached a player on Kansas City's baseball team. Some thought that rubbing some of the pin tar on their bat would give the batter a better grip.

Donation Appreciation

In the Fall issue of *Foundation Focus*, Meadowlark Foundation's bi-annual newsletter, Becky Fitzgerald included a request from Meadowlark Home Health for a car in good condition. The agency's business is booming, and adding a vehicle to their fleet would increase their options when transporting clients to appointments and/ or activities.

Resident Edith Doerry, apt. 212, responded in October by donating the red 1999 Oldsmobile Intrigue pictured above. This is the fourth car donated to Home Health in the past several years. All have been greatly appreciated!

"We've taken on a ton of new clients, so we have more people to drive to appointments," explained Angela Gerena, Home Health Office Manager. "Having another car will help us with scheduling." Gerena said Home Health staff drive their personal cars when seeing clients in their homes, but use a Meadowlark car if driving a client to an appointment.

Doerry said she considered giving her car to her grandson, but he's basketball player height at 6foot-8 and couldn't fit well behind the wheel.

If you have a lien-free title and the fair market value of your vehicle is less than \$5000, donating a vehicle is a relatively simple process. (Gifts valued at \$5000 or more are happily accepted, but the IRS requires more paperwork.) Many donated cars have become part of the Transportation or Home Health fleets, and others have been auctioned. If the vehicle is auctioned, the donor may designate which of Meadowlark's funds. programs or projects benefits from the sale.
