Memorial Day: "The Earl Project" Monday, May 27, from 2 to 4 p.m.

To celebrate Memorial Day, Meadowlark will be joined by Geraldine Craig, Professor of Art at Kansas State University to bring us "The Earl Project" Monday, May 27, from 2 to 4 p.m. The Project is named for Earl Molzen, a Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) survivor of World War II. Earl was an inspiration to his family for his kindness, as well as his unusual but delightful objects, creative interventions and "fixes" that he made over 60 years as part of life on his parents' central Kansas dairy farm.

"The Earl Project" engages veterans and soldiers in creating new, original works of visual art both individually and in a collective war stories scroll sculpture. It is a project based on the premise that making is cathartic, making feels food and making meaning of combat experience through art-telling stories has healing potential.

To participate, please bring any personal item including photographs, documents or cloth that represent your or a loved one's experience of serving in the military. Also bring details from memories you choose to share and military branch if possible. Together, you will photocopy onto fabric, embroider names and stitch to a community cloth started by "The Earl Project" for veterans, soldiers, family members and survivors.

Join us for this drop-in event Monday, May 27, any time between 2 and 4 p.m. in the

Community Room. All are invited to participate or come to observe to experience the event. No previous art-making experience is required.

Panama Canal

My husband, Gerry, did his first three years of orthopedic residency at the Portsmouth, Virginia Naval Hospital beginning in 1965. We laughed at the times when all personnel were in formation in uniform. He frustrated many picture takers who were wanting pictures of the mass sea of white uniforms. One problem, with a name like Blacker, he was in the front row in his blue Air Force unie.

I worked as a legal secretary in Norfolk and took care of the household as it was at the height of the Vietnam War and my husband worked long hours. The one break I remember was a short trip on a military plane to Panama. Gerry had previously met the military doctor of the AFB in Panama City. That doctor in turn had a neighbor and friend who was a Canal pilot. The pilot said if we would report to a certain dock at 4:00 in the morning, he would take us through the Canal. Done.

The ship was a huge Grace Line freighter with 12 passengers. The ship had been designed for 24 passengers but requirements changed that with more than 12 passengers, a medical type had to be onboard. Walls were removed so the state rooms were very large. Passengers were happy to have new blood on board and asked the cook for a special lunch on the deck.

The Canal pilot is in total control of the ship when it goes in the locks for the entire trip between Panama City and Cologne. His knowledge was incredible. He could fully describe any other vessel we saw, even ones that could barely be seen on the horizon – its name, country, cargo, destination, on and on. Any worldwide ship building company must turn in all the basic information to the Canal pilots, when a ship is first commissioned to be built.

We departed the ship with the pilot at Cologne as the ship was ready to enter the Caribbean. I have a picture of myself climbing down a flimsy rope ladder the equivalent of four stories to the deck of the tug. My husband and I returned by train through the forest back to Panama City.

David McCullough wrote a terrific book, *Path Between the Seas*, about the history of the Canal. America had been exploring the idea of a crossing through Nicaragua to take advantage of a very large lake, but President Taft decided to take over the Panama project that France was giving up.

travels. (Any little bit helps!)


