New Trail Leads to Dedicated Space

by Michele Riter Construction of Meadowlark's trail will add a paved path from the Tuttle Creek Boulevard entrance to Stillman Cemetery. After completion in the next few weeks. this will allow for easier access to the Stillman Cemetery. This addition to the trail will be wide enough for a golf cart to pass through.

Stillman Cemetery re-creates a cemetery of unknown name that originally lay about 60 yards to the southeast. Meadowlark Hills' commitment to honor the memory of the deceased led to the cemetery's relocation. The excavation was conducted by professional archeologists under the authority of the District Court. The remains were re-interred in 2007.

The cemetery was actively used circa 1860 to 1900. With the last burial, made in 1900, being that of Dr. William Henry Stillman, who owned the land. Dr. Stillman was a physician who operated an unofficial poor farm and possibly an orphanage.

The cemetery holds 17





graves, four of which are empty. One of these originally was the grave of Dr. Stillman's daughter, Elsie, who died in 1878 at the age of 18 months. Another was Dr. Stillman's original grave. Dr. Stillman died in September 1900. His and Elsie's remains were moved to sunset cemetery in March, 1901. The other two empty graves are those of Geary Taylor, who died in April 1875 at age 22, and his niece,

Martha Jane Taylor who lived only 3 days. The Taylors were moved to Sunset Cemetery in 1880. There were no headstones or markers of the size of the plots. During the excavations, some coffins were preserved and mostly intact, with others fallen apart in the soil.

Historical investigators worked to find records of who these individuals were that had been buried at Stillman Cemetery. An analytical reporter, studied the remains to determine the person's sex, age, and identifying artifacts. Along with that information, historical society records



Florida Panhandle

In 1996 I moved form a 2-year residency in downtown Los Angeles to Valparaiso, Florida, primarily because of its proximity to Eglin Air Force Base, the benefits of my military widow status, my age and that I like the Florida panhandle.

The Eglin AFB area is huge; I think about 450,000 acres. Most of the training for WW2 was conducted there. A civilian contracting company, Jackson Guard, is responsible for taking care of all the environmental property which includes the forested area and its inhabitants as well as a good bit of beach area.

Volunteers played a big part and I was proud to be one of them. I helped keep track of wild turkeys, beach mice, and did sea turtle patrol. There were burrowing owls who set up shop on the main bombing range. There was one big target where an owl had dug a nest. An owl kept watch by perching on a corner of the target. So much for the story of wise old owls.

The feral hogs were a nasty problem because they dig up anything, everything. They liked nests with eggs and small, defenseless critters and dug in the roots of forest growth.

My primary job was sea turtle patrol which I did for nine years; once a week at daylight from May through October. Most of the Florida sea turtle activity is in the warmer southern area. Some venture north to the Ft. Walton Beach barrier island, which is owned by the military. The island was very secure because of the classified activity. Not even active duty personnel were allowed without specific orders. So it made for a pleasant trip to the beach without all the distractions of human activity. There were also fenced off areas because of buried leftover debris from the extensive WW2 training.

I looked for turtle tracks out of the water to find a nest. Details of the nest were recorded including a GPS setting, fenced off with a notice that disturbance was prohibited by Federal law. Unfortunately the coyotes couldn't read. I found one nest where a coyote had dug outside the fence, then laterally to invade the fence. Anything of consequence had to be reported to Jackson Guard headquarters and they would send a biologist to determine procedure. One time a

biologist was evaluating a nest and got emphatically chewed out by a passerby. He explained who he was and why/what he was doing but was actually pleased that the person understood the importance of protecting the turtle nests.

One early morning I found babies who were struggling north instead of south. The sand crabs were happy and I salvaged a couple of babies from the jaws of a crab. I had left a container on the ATV so folded up my shirttail to hold them. As small as they are their little claws tickle. I was trying to take my shirt off the carry them and was doing a pretty strange dance to juggle all that. Then I looked up and realized I was about 20 feet from the road, a stopped truck and another going slow. There I was in a very restricted area, doing a weird dance and trying to undress. I was surprised that the air police didn't come visit. Highly unusual was that I found two different turtles who had made a nest then got lost trying to get back to the Gulf. One of them had made a couple of trips across a pond which was across the road from the fire station. Right idea, just the wrong puddle. I called the volunteer on the other run (one east, one west) for help. She came and asked the fire station for help. They brought their ATV and stretcher and delivered her to the right puddle. We even got acknowledgement from the National Wildlife Association.

were used to identify and find stories about those who had been buried there. Of the individuals interred here, Sarah Jane Jackson was about three years old when she died in November 1878. Her grave was identified from a footstone with the initials SJJ. Eliza Peters died in March 1881 at the age of 36. The identities of the other individuals are unknown.

Research was also completed on the traditional customs for funerals in the mid 1800's, including clothing styles and was implemented in the ceremony.

Although some minor changes occurred in its design, the smaller Stillman Cemetery is faithful to the original layout, orientation, and mode of interment. Each individual was (and is) laid on their back, and buried oriented perpendicular to the river, overlooking the Blue River Valley, with their head toward the west.

During the dedication, a horse-drawn merchant wagon carried wooden caskets in procession through Manhattan leading to Meadowlark Hills. Stories of the individuals were shared at the ceremony.

A 35-minute video about the relocation and dedication of the Stillman Cemetery from Sept. 14, 2007 will be shown in the Grosh Cinema on Wednesday, July 31, at 10 a.m.
