Town Hall Meeting Notes

Notes from Town Meeting led by Abby Cavender, Community Sales Leader, on Dec. 2.

Welcome & Introduction Abby Cavender welcomed everyone to the December meeting. She filled in for Monte Spiller since he joined the Meadowlark Travelers trip to Branson, along with over 40 residents and Passport members. Vee Mechsner, a new Meadowlark resident, was introduce.

Campus Updates Lonnie Baker reminded us that Meadowlark is continuing the design process of two different projects: the Monarch independent living apartments, and a capital campaign for a Wellness Center. The Monarch will have 24 units. The sales team has been working hard in the presales. Currently, 46 Priority Memberships have been purchases, meaning they are genuinely considering moving to the Monarch.

The Wellness Center will be located by Bramlage and will have many amenities, such as out-patient therapy, fitness center, Special Programs, and a warm water pool. With certain details being finalized no date for project completion has been determined

Lonnie shared that there is a plan for an addition to our staff parking lot of 85 parking spots and relies on an agreement with K-State. More details of all Meadowlark's growth and development to come!

Community Relations Update Sarah Duggan informed us of different ways Meadowlark is involved in the Manhattan community. Representatives of Meadowlark attended Mission Sunday at First Presbyterian Church and Riley Pride and was a sponsor for Halloween Hustle, a location for the Jingle Bell Rock Hunting Tag pick up and clues, and continuing to be active in the Manhattan Area Chamber of Commerce.

Sarah gave updates on the Kansas Alzheimer's disease Task Force that she was selected to be a part of for the past couple of months. They are completing their proposal to share in January to Congress.

Sarah also shared about the success of the Caring for Your Loved One with Dementia course held by UFM, Meadowlark, and K-State Global Campus. It was comprised of a four-week online course with two onsite days at Meadowlark. There were 19 total participants in this class. This class will be offered again in the spring. Michelle Haub, Special Programs Leader, and Sarah are in the beginning stages of working on a similar format for a class focused on Parkinson's disease.

Outdoor Encounters

At some point each fall we should pause and honor one of the most profound of evolutionary developments: the green leaves of flowering plants. Even though most of them last only one growing season, these leaves, and what they make possible, are an essential part of survival for many animals, even for the health of the very soil in which those plants grow. Leaves house the green pigment, chlorophyll, an essential part of the chemical pathway of photosynthesis that makes plant sugars. These sugars, via another chemical pathway, are the raw material the plant uses to trap and store energy, and this energy enables green plants to make the many products both they, and we, depend upon. Of basic importance is the fact that flowers, if fertilized, make the seeds that are both the basis for the next plant generation and a food type for many animals. It is said that humans could not exist without green plants and the many different items they provide. But we actually look forward to the demise of the leaves of our deciduous trees, to the fall colors that they show.

Humans invented agriculture some 10,000 years ago, but even during the many prior millennia, when we lived in hunter/gatherer groups, we—and many other animals—depended upon some leaves and many of the seeds, nuts, and fruits produced by flowering plants. Life, even though difficult, took place in a veritable Garden of Eden! Our world contains 250,000 to 400,000 species of flowering plants (depending upon which expert you consult), which includes some 60,000 tree species and many hundreds of species of woody shrubs. Kansas alone has some 90 tree species, and numerous woody shrubs—most native but a few imported.

But we now have largely lost our summer umbrella of living green shingles that also give shade to many different situations in Nature. In deciduous trees and shrubs, we celebrate leaf ephemerality by watching for color changes, knowing full well that change is related to leaf death and drop. Conifer leaves (needles) are lost on a more regular year-round basis, but with some showing a more pronounced rate of leaf death and drop in the fall.

Several factors influence fall leaf color:

increasing night length, lower air temperatures, distribution of leaf pigments, and genetics. Genetics determines why leaves or fruits of certain species turn certain colors. But the astronomically-based trend of steadily longer nights during fall is the big unvarying factor in the equation. Color intensity is enhanced by ample rainfall and by steadily falling temperatures, but is impeded by suddenly freezing temperatures.

The green pigment, chlorophyll, during the growing season, is constantly being produced and broken down within leaves, but chlorophyll production slows down and eventually stops as nights lengthen and temperatures drop. And other existing pigments are unmasked. The carotenoid pigments, present along with chlorophyll during the growing season, produce the yellow, orange, and brown pigments seen in some leaves and in corn, buttercups, daffodils, carrots, rutabagas, and bananas.

The anthocyanin pigments, most produced as days shorten and nights lengthen, give their colors to some leaves and to cranberries, red apples, blueberries, Concord grapes, cherries, plums, and strawberries. But genetics plays the big role of determining the combination and concentration of carotenoid and anthocyanin pigments present in both ripe fruits and fall leaves.

Many marvelous processes are in action as plants and animals prepare for the cold, but one of the most obvious, and most beautiful, is that process by which trees and shrubs shed their most vulnerable parts: leaves. They will be broken down over the winter by microbes into compounds and elements. These chemicals can, in turn, be used for building new plants and animals. The cycle continues, and there's always next fall!
