


Fort Riley, with its long history dating back to the mid-1800s, has accumulated tales of eerie encounters, unexplained noises, and ghostly figures over the decades. Here are some of the most famous stories from around the base. **Happy Haunting, Ft. Riley!**




Custer House, one of the oldest buildings at Fort Riley, is renowned for its paranormal activity. Named after General George Custer, who was stationed here before heading to the Battle of Little Bighorn, the house has a reputation for ghostly happenings. Many say the spirit of Custer's wife, Libbie, still lingers, as do the spirits of unknown soldiers. Visitors report seeing shadowy figures in the windows, doors that open and close on their own, and cold spots in the rooms — even during summer.

Did You Know? *Libbie Custer was known for her deep connection to the military community, and some believe her spirit is still watching over Fort Riley.*

Ghostly Cavalry Riders of Camp Forsyth

Camp Forsyth, near the Fort Riley stables, is known for sightings of ghostly riders. People have reported hearing the distinct sounds of horses galloping late at night, though none are to be seen. Witnesses describe seeing spectral riders dressed in old cavalry uniforms, riding across the parade grounds in complete silence. This eerie spectacle has been witnessed both by soldiers and civilians, especially on misty nights.



St. Mary's Chapel, with its Gothic Revival architecture, is both beautiful and eerie. The chapel is said to be haunted by the spirit of a young woman who lost her life under tragic circumstances. Witnesses describe seeing a female figure in white, who appears to float silently down the aisle before vanishing. Some say they've heard a woman's quiet sobbing echoing through the empty chapel late at night, adding to its haunted reputation.

Legend or Truth? *Some speculate the woman may have been a soldier's fiancée, heartbroken by loss, her spirit forever bound to the chapel.*

Historical Insight: *Fort Riley was home to the famous 9th and 10th Cavalry Regiments, also known as the Buffalo Soldiers. Some believe these ghostly riders might be the lingering cavalrymen.*

Each of these tales contributes to the unique atmosphere of Fort Riley, where the past seems to blend eerily with the present. Whether you're a believer in the supernatural or not, these stories add


Volunteer & Tech Helper

Art Engagement *from the* Beach Museum of Art



The lines an artist creates can surround a geometric or organic shape, divide a space, contain a form, and develop visual texture. They are often expressive, evoking messages and movement. We have psychological responses to the types of lines we view. For example, vertical lines convey height and strength, horizontal lines relay stability, curved lines communicate comfort, jagged lines impart turmoil, and zig-zag lines send a sense of restlessness or anxiety. Thin lines appear delicate, and thick lines show strength. Using a combination of lines may add balance or tension to a composition. In the drawing shown here, the lines define organic shapes. What types of lines do you see, and what do they express to you?
